Where Are They Now: An Update on Husky Alum Les Driscoll



For all the years I was coaching the team and even now after my tenure, Les Driscoll has been a consistent donor and supporter. Les was one of Dr. Hughes' team members in the early days of the program and like many athletes back then, myself included, did many other sports before focusing on being a gymnast. It is a real pleasure and treat to go back to those early days of the program and see how it was. We get that from Les' story in his own words right here. Enjoy!!

I graduated from Ilwaco High School where I was the quarterback on the football team, played basketball, and was on the track team when we won the county championship. The high hurdles, low hurdles, and pole vault were my best events and I took first place in all three. I decided to attend the University of Washington and worked my way through school, as in those days there were hardly any scholarships.

In 1955 when I was on the UW track team my coach, Hec Edmundson, advised me to work out with the gymnasts in order to strengthen my upper body. I was a pole vaulter on the UW track team for five seasons. As a P.E. major I was required to take a class in gymnastics and Dr. Eric Hughes was the instructor. He emphasized safety and was a very good coach. I joined the gymnastic team and participated in the events of the side horse, rope climb, and horizontal bar. Some of my teammates were Bill Crow, Charlie Denny, Jim Lang, and Pat McGunnigle. I remember very well the first time I did a giant swing on the horizontal bar, and also when I did a backflip on the trampoline after having risen up about ten feet in the air. In 1958, I was honored to be selected as the recipient of the Inspirational Award for the Men's Gymnastic Team.

When I was participating in gymnastics at the university a coach from West Seattle High School, Cale Campbell, used to watch the gymnastic practices and meets. Cale wanted me to teach and coach at West Seattle. I sent an application to the Seattle School District and they hired me to teach Physical Education. I was also the assistant track coach. A while later I became the head track coach. We had many wins. One of West Seattle's pole vaulters, Dennis Peacock, won the state champion-



ship. Brian Sternberg took second place and a few years later went on to break the world pole vault record.

When Seattle Schools added gymnastics as a sport, I gave up coaching track so I could implement and develop the gymnastics program at West Seattle High School. We had strong gymnastics teams. Our team won the city championship most years. In 1972 we won the state championship. Scott Maxwell was a champion on the rings and Ron Starheim was state champion on the vault. Around 1974, Seattle Schools dropped the sport of men's gymnastics in order to comply with Title IX. That year the West Seattle women's gymnastics coach was transferred. The principal asked me to accept the position of women's gymnastic coach so that the sport would not be dropped. We had good teams and won many dual meets. One of the women gymnasts, Mona Heisterman, won second place in the state for the allaround.

I have been married to my wife, Ann, for sixty-three years. We have two sons, Daniel (a UW graduate) and Dennis. Sadly, our daughter Ava passed away a little over a year ago. She was also a UW graduate.

For many years our family spent the summers on Willapa Bay at Oysterville, Washington where we owned a small oyster business. Last year the business was sold. We now live in Ilwaco, Washington.




