Selfless Acts

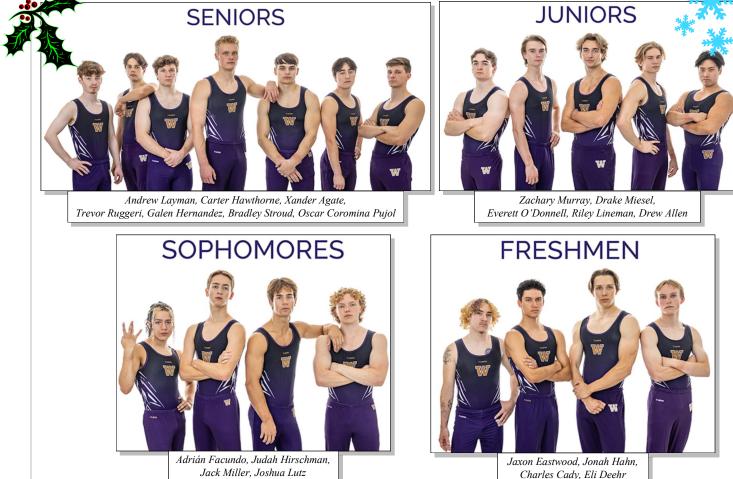
Our team not only will undertake challenges on the competition floor but this season has really already start-

In Memoriam: Remembering Friend of the Huskies Ken Madden

It was with great sorrow that I heard of the passing of Ken Madden, who was one of the gypsy alumni who used to come in and work out with the team back when I was on the team. As Husky team members, we were always very thankful for the alumni from other schools who came to our gym to work out and give us some good coaching advice as well. Ken was part of the group that included Cam Oliva, Shawn Skerrett, and James Hattori. Ken embedded himself in the local gymnastics commu-

Ken was born in Boston, MA in August 1958, the fourth of six children. His early years were spent with extended family in the area and playing hockey on the neighborhood ice rink. During this period he started camping and hiking with friends, his initial introduction to the great outdoors.



Ken's high school years were spent in the Atlanta area and his school had a gymnastics team which was his introduction to the sport. Ken went on to attend Georgia Tech for their engineering program and their gymnastics team, 1976-1980. His college years were a balance of the engineering curriculum and gymnastics practice.

After college, Ken worked in the Atlanta area for two years while he considered a move to the Pacific Northwest. It was after his move to Seattle that Ken renewed his interest in gymnastics and began judging boy's JO meets with Jim Adams, Jeff Tretheway, and others throughout the PNW. This experience introduced Ken to the many local gyms, and eventually the old Hec Ed gymnastics gym at UW.

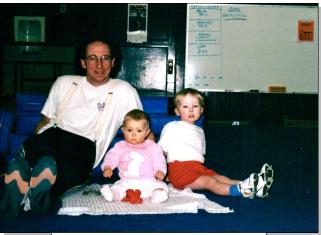

Ken went on to teach several courses for The Mountaineers including winter camping, crevasse rescue, and emergency winter bivouac.
